7. To preserve and improve local public transportation services, including those for youth, commuters, seniors, and people with disabilities, shall the Alameda-Contra Costa Transit District, or A.C. Transit, extend its existing parcel tax at the current level of 8 dollars per month for 20 years with no increase, with independent oversight and all money spent locally?

To finance the construction, development, acquisition, and preservation of housing affordable to low and middle-income individuals and families through programs that will prioritize vulnerable populations throughout Alameda County such as working families, veterans, seniors, homeless, and disabled persons; and to provide for homeownership down payment assistance opportunities for middle-income households; shall the County of Alameda issue 500 million dollars in general obligation bonds, subject to independent citizen oversight and regular audits?

After the bonds are issued, the tax for an average home would be 12 dollars per one hundred thousand dollars in assessed value for the bond per year over 30 years.

To maintain academic excellence, shall the Berkeley Unified School District replace its expiring special tax with an annual tax at thirty-six cents per square foot of residential and commercial buildings? This would be for eight years, with an annual cost-of-living adjustment and a low-income senior exemption. Funding shall be used only for designated purposes including class size reduction, libraries, music, arts education, learning technology, teacher training, and academic support for struggling students. An independent citizens' committee and auditors will monitor this fund.

After the bonds are issued, the tax for an average home would be 96 dollars per year over 35 years.
